CHAIRMAN 'S REPORT

As the first year of Canally 's new life draws to a close I can reflect on a quite successful year with the following milestones reached:

- Safe tow from Euston & slipping of Canally in Berri
- Major power & water infrastructure installed in the wharf area
- 20 new hull planks fitted whilst in Berri
- Safe delivery of Canally to her new home of Morgan
- Safe delivery of steam engine to Morgan
- Set up of Station Master 's House as Canally headquarters
- Purchase of a further 40 hull planks to be fitted in 2013
- Boiler inspection carried out with permission given for tube removal so we can progress to the next stage
- Committee decision that the Canally superstructure reflect the 1920' s era as it was working out of Morgan during that period
- Rudder removed & transported to Armfield slip at Goolwa for rebuild Other jobs in progress are:
- Temporary roof over steam engine, ground work completed
- Temporary roof over hull, we have had some trusses donated
- Continuing steel painting & bilge cleaning by Cadell Training Centre people
- Rudder rebuild

HISTORY CORNER

To continue with the history of PS Canally - at the end of Tommy Freeman 's riverboat career in 1920, he sold the PS Canally to William Tinks of Morgan. But by 1925, the registered owners of PS Canally were Francis and Tinks, a partnership that started in 1912 between Captain Albert Francis and William Tinks. During this time of ownership, the boat was used to haul granite from the quarry at Mannum to assist with building the locks. The Francis & Tinks company was dissolved in 1925 and the PS Canally was purchased by the Public Works Department of NSW to continue on the construction of locks and weirs in the Murray river. Ownership then passed to Norm Collins during 1935 where he used her for Lock 15 building at Euston. So she had a long association with lock building in her life timea true working boat
